
Regional Superior speaks...

Silver Bells Ring!



The year 2022 is a hallowed year for Mary Ward School, Lubhu, as we completed 25 years of loving and dedicated service in the field of girl-child education and women empowerment in Nepal. With deep love and profound gratitude to God, a Solemn Thanksgiving Eucharist was celebrated in the school hall

under the new truss decorated beautifully with colourful photo folders of 25 precious years!

The main celebrant of the Eucharistic Celebration was His Lordship Bishop Paul Simick along with Fr. Silas Bogatti, the V.G., Fr. Pius Perumana, the Chancellor, Fr. Stephen SDB and ten other priests.

Sr. Jessy in her introductory address said, "The world is full of angels. If you can't find one, be one. We are not born into this world merely as spectators to passively watch others living their lives to the full but in fact to



contribute to make the world a beautiful place to live in. Life presents before us golden opportunities to make the world a beautiful place by a kind deed, a warm smile, a genuine gesture of appreciation and unselfish love for the unloved and underprivileged and we believe that is the origin of Mary Ward School, Lubhu". Reading aloud the letter of appreciation of our General, M. Jane Livesey, on the occasion of the Silver Jubilee, Sr. Jessy concluded the welcoming note.

She described her singing ability as her magic wand that manifests numerous successful projects, including education, health, children’s rights and women empowerment projects. Her voice is named as heavenly voice with healing power.)

The World Environment Day

Led by the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and held annually on June 5 since 1973, World Environment Day is the largest global platform for environmental public outreach and is celebrated by millions of people across the world. The Himalayan country, Nepal, too doesn't go backward in celebrating it in a befitting manner, especially in our CJ Schools in Nepal. Following is a short account of how we celebrated the day in our different educational institutions: -

St. Mary's, Biratnagar: -

On the World Environment Day, the school participated in a speech competition which was



organized by Biratnagar Municipality. Congratulations to our students who won the first place. This year we established an 'Environment Club' which is the need of the hour as our students see a lot of harm done to the environment.

St. Mary's, Gorkha: -

The Forest Department of Gorkha District offered us many saplings free of cost to be planted on World Environment Day. The students along with the sisters and teachers planted many saplings to promote the value of having more trees and saving the environment. The stu-



dents of the environment club put up an assembly during which they depicted the importance of trees through mimes, dances, skits as well as video presentations. All the students participated in a pre-arranged drawing competition in which they had to depict environmental degradation. The winners of the competition were awarded with prizes and certificates.

St. Mary's, Pokhara: -

A meaningful prayer Assembly was conducted by Class X to mark the day and the Bulletin Boards of the Four Houses were decorated for the occasion. The four Houses took part in the Wall Painting Competition. The students were so creative, expressive and artistic that they depicted well the theme of the year "Only One Earth" on the wall in front of the school. Various other competitions too were held in the school like poem recitation, I love my earth – photography, recycling of solid waste, creative art and craft, slogan writing, drawing on the environmental issues etc.

The JPIC - Student Unit had a beautiful painting of a huge tree on the Assembly ground with the theme written in the middle and with a drawing of the world map. The most exciting part



of the celebration was the Street Play organized by the Environment club members along with the teachers in Hallan Chowk – Lakeside with the theme of the year to bring awareness and to alert

the crowd of the impact of inhuman activities on Mother Earth, and the greediness and the chaos created by them.

St. Mary's, Kathmandu: -

To practise environment-friendly living, our students of Class VI, under the guidance of Mrs. Sabina Basnet, presented a short skit to kick off the celebrations on the World Environment Day. In addition, the first woman journalist to climb Mount Everest from both Nepal and China sides, Mrs. Kalpana Maharjan, was the keynote speaker at a brief program that the environment club organized in the auditorium. The determi-



nation of Kalpana Maharjan to conquer Everest despite all the difficulties impressed the students.

Some saplings were planted in our compound. Students actively engaged in various competitions, including rangoli, photography, collage, poster making, and illustrations on environmental awareness.

of the Congregation in depth. The input sessions, group sharing and bonding walks helped one another to come closer and to know more of one




another. The Eucharistic celebrations presided over by Rev Bishop Paul Simick, Fr. Amrit Rai
